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On the journey with Paul: Grow into mentorship

As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another.

Proverbs 27:17

Mentorship plays a key role in the Bible. We see mentors in all forms and shapes from Moses and Naomi to Elizabeth, Paul, Barnabas and Jesus our biggest mentor. Some of the key aspects which distinguish mentoring from other relationships such as friendship, coaching or being a teacher are: influence, commitment, being an example, and caring for others.

Influence

Read about people who influenced Paul's life in Acts 9:23-27 and 11:19-30.

 Draw a timeline of your life's phases, such as pre-primary, primary and high school. Fill in where people have in influenced your life spiritually by writing their name in that phase. While you write their name, think about how they specifically influenced you.

Commitment

Read about Paul's commitment through Christ in 2 Corinthians 11:28-29; 12:5 and 2 Timothy 2:10.

Mentorship is about commitment. This means not only to be committed to a mentee, but also to be committed to grow in your own relationship with God.

• Go outside and look at a branch of a tree or a plant. For every leave on that branch, try to name a way in which you can grow in your relationship with God.

Being an example

Read about how Paul learned how to be an example in 1 Corinthians 11:1; Philippians 3:17 and 4:9.

A mentor is someone others look up to. Not because they are perfect, but because they follow Jesus. As a mentor, you have to walk the walk and talk the talk by being an example in: faith (what I believe and serve God), life (how I live according to God's will, habits, and behaviour) and love (how I care and love).

• Think about who sets a good example for you then write the different characteristics of a good mentor on small cards. Stick them on your mirror as a reminder to walk the walk and talk the talk.

Caring for others

Being a mentor means that you have to care about others and built a real, meaningful relationship with them. It is about walking together and doing life together.

Read about how Paul taught others to care in 1 Thessalonians 2:10-12.

• Draw circles of the different areas of your life, such as school, work, friends, family, church, sports, interests and daily routines. Write in every circle the people who crosses your path in that area (people whom you have or can spend time with). Is there anyone in particular you feel called to mentor?

Do: I see a world everyone experiences Jesus' love

- Choose words or short sentences which mean something to you. Combine with a photo or background and share on Instagram or Facebook. Be creative.
- What do you know about other religions? Imagine sitting in a bus next to someone of a different faith. How would you start a conversation with him/her?
- Pray for someone by name for a whole week that needs to get to know Jesus, the Saviour-King.

- What makes you feel powerless?
- Where do you need to experience God's favour or presence?

Do

• Think of Jesus-stories from the Bible where we can see Jesus doing these things. They can be literally or figuratively.

Do: I see a world where people are free from addiction and slavery

Jesus heals ten men with leprosy

Believe

- What do you know about leprosy?
- What do you think the lepers expected when they called out to Jesus for mercy?
- We easily ignore people we walk by on the streets, why did Jesus stop and interact with these lepers despite the fact that the law labelled them as unclean?

Dream

- Healing is not only about the physically, sometimes we need emotional healing as well. Where or when have you seen Jesus healing people, giving them hope, bringing them joy, changing their attitude or giving them a new sense of purpose?
- Name the areas in your life where you need Jesus healing?
- Pray about this with someone you trust.

Do

• Jesus was able to make a difference in the lepers' lives, so he stopped and did so. When or where do you need to stop and make the time to make a difference?



Let's heal

"When he saw he was healed, he came back, praising God in a loud voice." Luke 17:11-19

Jesus heals the man with leprosy

Believe

- What do you think is our modern-day leprosy?
- In your community, name the group(s) of people that may not easily be received by the rest of the society. (The people you often ignore.)
- Why do we choose to ignore people instead of interacting with them?

Dream

- What is the different kind of needs people have in your community that influence their health?
- Is there anybody in your community who might need help with emotional healing?

Do: I see a world where everyone has access to health care, clean water and sanitation

- Launch a "WaterWise" awareness month on your social networks. Update your Facebook, Instagram, Twitter or Snapchat each day with tips, facts, and photos about how to save water.
- Organise a beach, river or park clean-up with your friends, school or church.
- Collect toiletries to donate to people in need, like a shelter, children's home or soup kitchen. Ask a nurse or doctor in your local church or community to give a basic hygiene talk about doing a lot with a little before you hand out the toiletries.



Jesus our Friend

"I have called you friends." John 15:9-17

Love one another

Believe

- How does Jesus describe the love he has for us as his disciples?
- In verse 15 Jesus says that he no longer calls us servants. What is true about a friendship that is not about a master-servant relationship?
- How is the Father's love connected to Jesus' love?
- What is this mirror image of love supposed to tell us about Jesus' love for his people, and the love we should remain in?

Dream

- What does it mean to you that Jesus is your friend?
- Jesus chose us to bear fruit that will last. How can you live in this community of love?
- What can you do with friends that influence you badly?

Do

- Think about a time when you were reluctant to befriend someone who didn't fit in your mould of friend. Why was it difficult to befriend them?
- Pray for your friends. Pray also for new friendships.



Let's befriend

"My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you." John 15:9-17

Love one another

Believe

- Read the text again. Do you notice something new in the text?
- This passage challenges us to not only love and befriend people we like or those you would like to be friends with, but to love and befriend everybody. What implications does this have?

Dream

- Our choices of friends say a lot about who we are. Are you making an effort to make friends with different types of people?
- How you treat your friends (and they you) is important. How can you develop healthy friendships?

Do: I see a world where people from different races, cultures and ages get along

- Is there an old age home in your community? Challenge your friends to "adopt a grandma or grandpa" or two. Visit them regularly and spend time with them like you would with other friends.
- During break time at school, take turns to sit with different groups.
- Make a deliberate decision to befriend someone from a different culture in your class. Go and visit them at their home and invite them to yours.



Teacher

"Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations." Matthew 28:16-20

The great commission

Believe

- Describe the way that Jesus made disciples or modelled disciple-making for his followers.
- How did He share, show, and teach the Word while serving the world?

Dream

- What is Jesus teaching you at the moment?
- What is He using to teach you (a mentor, a group, the Bible, music, circumstances, experiences)?
- Jesus ends the passages with the words, "And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." What difference does Jesus' promise in his final sentence make in your life?

Do

• What is something new you learned from this passage? Think of one person you can share it with today.



Let's teach

"And teaching them to obey everything ..." Matthew 28:16-20

The great commission

Believe

- Read the verses again imagining how the disciples first heard the words.
- How overwhelming do you think it was for the disciples to be one of the eleven persons instructed to "make disciples of all nations"?
- How challenging does it sound to you today?

Dream

• For you to live out the "great commission" (the instruction) every day and everywhere you go, what changes or commitments do you need to make?

Do: I dream of a world where everyone has opportunity to receive good education

- Make a list of all the teachers at your school. Take a few names each day and pray for them by name.
- Offer to help with homework at a children's home.
- Ask your friends, family, school or church to donate old stationary and basic school clothes and take it to a small rural school or other charities
- Join a holiday school outreach where extra classes are offered for rural communities.



Jesus our Helper

"He had compassion on them." Matthew 14:13-21

Jesus feeds the 5 000

Believe

- Jesus intended to be alone (verse 13) on his boat, but the crowd followed him on foot. What does Jesus' reaction towards them reveal about him?
- Why did Jesus choose not to send the people home, but to give them something to eat instead?

Dream

- What does it mean to you to know that Jesus sees your needs and that he has compassion for you?
- In John 6:9 we read that the fish and bread was given by a boy who chose to give his little to feed a lot. What does this version of the story tell you about the way in which Jesus helps people?

Do

- Make a list of things that you need help with.
- Pray about it and speak to a leader about where you can find support.



Let's serve

"You give them something to eat." Matthew 14:13-21

Jesus feeds the 5 000

Believe

- Jesus told his disciples that they should give the crowd something to eat. Why do you think Jesus challenged them to do so?
- How is their response (verse 17) similar to our response when we get challenged with something big?
- How does their response reveal where their focus is?

Dream

- How is giving and providing for others something we ought to be doing in our lives as one of Jesus' disciples?
- What is some of the needs you get challenged with in your community?

Do: I see a world without poverty, injustice and unemployment

- Go through your closet or room. Is there anything that you have two or more of, or things that you do not use anymore? Collect all the items and donate it to organisation (shelters, children's homes, local churches) that can use it.
- Take an extra sandwich to school and during break time, go sit with the buddy or group that is half on their own and share your snacks with them.
- Is there a homeless shelter in your community? Find out what their needs are and how you can help them.



Jesus our Peace-maker

"Turn to them the other cheek also." Matthew 5:38-48

An eye for an eye

Believe

- Why is Jesus called our "peace" in Ephesians 2:14?
- Why does Jesus say we are to treat our enemies with love? Why is this extraordinary?
- Can you think of other stories in the Bible where Jesus put himself second?

Dream

- Read Philippians 4:4-9
- Are you at peace with God? Why, or why not?
- What does it mean to you that Jesus is peace and gives you peace?

Do

- Think of your relationships with family and friends. With whom do you have a troubled or unstable relationship? With whom do you have superficial relationship?
- Think of someone you can call or visit today to make peace.
- Pray about your relationships.



Let's make peace

"Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." Matthew 5:38-48

An eye for an eye

Believe

- Look closely at verses 38-42. How is our natural response in contradiction with the response that Jesus advocates?
- Verse 48 says to be perfect as your heavenly father is perfect. This strikes us as one of the most difficult verses in all of this sermon and maybe all the Bible. Why do you think Jesus ends this section this way?

Dream

- What is accomplished by turning the other cheek, going the extra mile, or giving your "cloak"?
- Can you think of a time when you went the second mile for someone or something? Or when you were called to go the second mile and failed to do so?

Do: I believe in a world free of hatred, violence and crime

- Bake cupcakes and take it to the local police station.
- Verbal, emotional and physical bulling is very common in most communities. Learn more about bulling and join an anti-bully campaign. Visit <u>www.</u> jagfoundation.org.za or google #cool2Bkind.
- Find out if there is any shelter for abused women in your community. How can you support them?
- Join a "big sister" or "big brother" program and mentor an "act risk" youth.



Passion-giver

"At once they left their nets and followed him." Mark 1:16-20

Four fishermen follow Jesus

Believe

- Jesus did not go to the synagogues and call the devoted Jewish leaders of that time to follow Him. He called men with no special training but who were willing. What does this say about Jesus' requirements to be His follower?
- The disciples had to make a decision between their jobs and family or following Jesus. Why do you think they did it?

Dream

- What does it mean to "follow" Jesus? What is He saying? What is He doing? Where is He going?
- Think about a time when you had to make a tough choice to step out in faith and follow Jesus.

Do

- What are some obstacles people face today when deciding to passionately follow Jesus?
- Where in your life do you lack passion for Jesus? Share this with Jesus and ask Him to ignite your passion.



Let's activate

"Come, follow me," Jesus said, "and I will send you out to fish for people." Mark 1:16-20

Four fishermen follow Jesus

Believe

- Read the text again. Do you notice something new in the story?
- What does Jesus mean by the words "fish for people"? How can you do this practically?

Dream

- In what ways do you "follow" Jesus every day in your normal routine?
- Name ways in which you can activate others to make a difference.

Do: I see a world where young people take initiative to solve problems

- Only through action do words take meaning. Think about all the things in our community you and your friend complain about. Make a list.
- Choose one issue on your list. How can you take action?
- Find a mentor who is also passionate about the same problems you want to address.
- Prepare a plan to address this issue and ask your mentor to help you to take action.

Pray for each of the following God-inspired dreams for South Africa and the world. Use them to also pray for your own needs, family and friends as well as people, projects and issues in your own community. Pray that God will use you to make a difference.



What is it?

#Imagine kidz is a nationwide movement, bringing children between the ages of 10-12 years together from all backgrounds. This experience is built around a 3 day event, similar to that of a traditional holiday club. During this experience, each host will focus on Praise & Worship, relevant activities, arts and crafts and teachings to empower children to transform their homes and schools with the love of Jesus.

When is it?

Any 3 days during the September/October school holidays. (Although there can be arranged to host the experience on any other date)

Where is it?

All over South Africa! Any congregation can register to be a host of this experience. Don't let your community miss out!

For who is it?

For the whole congregation! Children between the ages of 10-12 years attend the event, while teenagers (and adults) host the event and assist as group leaders.
